As a Veteran Consultant on four research projects, Dave Crocker is pretty busy. The former Navy electronics technician is involved in research projects examining shared decision making in lung cancer screening, penicillin allergy validity, community care billing issues, and the value added when Veteran Consultants are on research teams. Through these projects, Dave contributes his unique perspective to the development of proposals, interview guides, and promotional materials. Read more about Dave's experiences:

What motivated you to participate in the Veteran Consultant Network?

I'm an engineer by education and so I like technical things. I have a fairly extensive background as a participant on a number of different research studies, so I thought this was a unique opportunity to see research from the other side of the table. It also gave me an opportunity to be of service to others, which is important to me.

What have you enjoyed about your experience?

The ability to explore deeper than I normally would by myself, specific subject areas that are of interest to me. One of the nice things is you can choose to say no if you're asked to be a consultant, and you go back on the waiting list for the next project to come up.

What would you tell other Veterans interested in becoming a Veteran Consultant? You get to meet and interact with a very diverse and experienced group of individuals. Some are Veterans, some aren't. Lots of different backgrounds and experiences, just interesting people. And you're there for a common reason, the project that you're on, so you've got a focal point. It's nice to have that interaction—community, I guess, would be one term I would use. That feels good.

Happening Elsewhere in Veteran Engagement


Our Milwaukee colleagues are also collaborating with Veterans. Their decadelong work was recently highlighted in a special issue of the <u>Journal of Humanistic</u> <u>Psychology</u> on Veterans' health and wellbeing (Franco 2020).

The work of Dr. Jeff Whittle, a physician and investigator at the Milwaukee VA, is included in the article. He has partnered with <u>Dryhootch</u>, a nonprofit organization formed by combat Veterans to help Veterans in their return home, since 2010. First, he helped them to collect data from Veterans about the community services they would like and the reasons they may not engage with VAbased services; they prepared a report that was shared with stakeholders. Now Dryhootch is actively engaged with VA programs to provide peer support, readjustment support, legal help, family support and more.
